All schools are supported to be as inclusive as possible, with the needs of students with a Special Educational Need/s being met in a mainstream setting wherever possible, where families want this to happen.

B. HOW COULD MY CHILD GET HELP?

Students in school will get support that is specific to their individual needs. This may all be provided by the class teacher or may involve:

- Other staff in the school, or within the Partnership, such as a Learning Support Assistant, Counsellor, Mentor, Learning Support Unit staff
- Staff who may visit the school from the Local Authority central services such as the ASDOutreach Team (CIR), Physiotherapy or Sensory Service (for students with a hearing or visual need)
- Staff who may visit from outside agencies such as the Speech and Language therapy (SALT) service, Educational Psychologist, Occupational Therapist and CAMHS dependent on meeting referral criteria

Specialist monitoring and assessment by outside agencies e.g. Speech and Language therapy or ASD Outreach (CIR)

Stage of SEN Code of Practice – school support stage – identified as needing some extra specialist support in school from a professional outside the school. This may be from:

 Local Authority central services such as the ASD Outreach Team (CIR) or Sensory Service (for studnents with a hearing or visual need)

- sessions for your child with targets to help your child to make more progress
- A Learning Support Assistant/teacher or outside professional (like a Speech and Language Therapist) will run these small group sessions
- Your child will have been identified by the class teacher/SENCO (or you will have raised your worries) as needing more specialist input instead of or in addition to class teaching and intervention groups
- You will be asked to give your permission for the school to refer your child to an outside professional e.g. a Speech and Language Therapist or Educational Psychologist. This will help the school and yourself understand your child's particular needs better and be able to support them better in school
- The outside professional will work with your child to understand their needs and make recommendations, which may include:
- Making changes to the way your child is supported in class e.g. some individual support or changing some aspects of teaching to support them better
- Support to set targets which will include their specific expertise
- A group run by school staff under the guidance of the outside professional e.g. a social skills group
- A group or individual work with outside professional
- The school may suggest that your child needs some individual support in school. They will tell you how the support will be used and what strategies will be put in place

interventions regardless of their stage of the SEN Code of Practice – they may have been identified by the class teacher as needing some extra support in school

Students with specific barriers to learning that cannot be overcome through whole class teaching and intervention

Specified individual support for your child

This is usually provided via a Statement of Special Educational Needs or an Education, Health and Care Plan (ECHP). This means your child will have been identified as needing a particularly high level of individual or small group teaching, which cannot be provided from the budget available to the school

Usually your child will also need specialist support in school from a professional outside the school. This may be from:

- Local Authority central services such as the ASD Outreach Team or Sensory Service (for students with a hearing or visual need)
- Outside agencies such as the Speech and Language therapy (SALT) service or CAMHS

- The school (or you) can request that the Local Authority carry out a statutory assessment of your child's needs. This is a legal progress and you can find more details on the Suffolk County Council website (hyperlink)
- After the reports have all been sent in, the Local Authority will decide if your child's needs are severe, complex and lifelong and that they need more than 20 hours of support in school to make good progress. If this is the case they will write a Statement of Special Educational Needs or an EHCP. If this is not the case, they will ask the school to continue with the support and also set up a meeting in school to ensure your child makes as much progress as possible
- The statement or EHCP will outline the number of hours of individual/small group support your child will receive from the LA and how the support should be used and what strategies must be put in place. It will also have long and short term goals for your child
- The LSA/TA will be used to support your child with whole class learning, individual programmes/small groups

Students whose learning needs are:

- Severe, complex and lifelong
- May qualify for Higher Tariff Needs funding

How can I let the school know I am concerned about my child's progress in school?	 If you have concerns about your child's progress you should contact your child's teacher/Form tutor If you are not happy that the concerns are being managed and that your child is still not making progress you should either contact the Curriculum Leader or the Pastoral Leader, depending on the nature of the concern, copying in the SENCO to any correspondence If you are still not happy you should contact the Head Teacher/SENCo
How will the school let me know if they have any concerns about my child's learning in school?	 When a teacher or parent has raised concerns about a child's progress, and targeted teaching has not met the child's needs, the teacher much raise this with the SENCO If your child is then identified as not making progress the school will contact you to discuss this with you in more detail: To listen to any concerns you may have To plan any additional support your child will receive To discuss with you any referrals to outside professionals to support your child's learning
How is extra support allocated to students and how do they move between the different levels?	 The school budget includes money for supporting students with SEN The Head Teacher decides on the budget for SEN in consultation with the school governors, on the basis of needs in the school
	 The SENCO and members of the Senior Leadership Team (SLT) discuss all the information they have about SEN in the school including: The students getting extra support The students needing extra support The students who have been identified as not making as much progress as expected deciding what resources/training and support is needed
How are the teachers in school helped to work with students with SEN and what training do they have?	There will be a Partnership training plan according to need
How will the teaching be adapted for my child with learning needs?	See school SEN policy for details

How will we measure the progress of your child in school?

- Your child's progress is continually monitored by his/her class teacher
- His/her progress is reviewed formally every term and a National Curriculum level is given for each subject.
- If your child is in Year 7 and above, but is not yet at National Curriculum levels, a more sensistive assessment tool is used which shows their level in more detail and will also show smaller but signficiant steps of progress. The levels are called 'P levels'
- At the end of Key Stage 2 all students are required to be formally assessed. This is something the government requires all schools to do and the results are published nationally
- The progress of students with a statement of SEN/EHCP is formally reviewed at an Annual Review with all adults involved with the child's education, the student and parent(s)/carer(s)
- The SENCO will also review progress of cohorts of students with SEN to inform training needs

How will we support your child when they are leaving this school or moving to another class/year?

We recognise that 'moving on' can be difficult for a child with SEN and take steps to ensure that any transition is as smooth as possible

If your child is moving to another school:

- We will contact the school SENCO and ensure he/she knows about any special arrangements or support that need to be made for your child
- We will make sure that all records about your child are passed on as soon as possible
- Arrange additional transition visits according to need

When moving classes in school:

Information including Pupil Passport and data, is accessible to all teachers

In Year 11/13:

- Students will receive appropriate careers guidance and support to discuss options and pathways and will have opportunities to attend Sixth Form and College open evenings/taster days
- Students will have support from a Learning Support Assistant, where appropriate, to prepare and attend the interview at a Sixth Form School or College
- The school SENCo will liaise with relevant staff at the new provision to ensure your child has a smooth transition
