








Evergreen Nursery Home Learning

This week our learning will be based around the story 'Doug the Bug That Went Boing' by Sue Hendra.					
AM	<p>Share the story</p> <p>Read the story 'Doug the Bug that went Boing' with your grown up. If you do not have the paper copy of the story, here is a link to the story on YouTube:</p> <p>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=sAw_t2OG4nE</p> <p>Tell your grownup what your favourite part of the story was. Why did you like this part the best? Have you ever seen a bug inside your house?</p> 	<p>Look at the 'c'/'k' sound</p> <p>This week we are looking at the 'c'/'k' sound. This sound is special because there are two letters that we can use that make that same sound.</p> <p>Watch the Jolly Phonics video for the c/k sound here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=bZNxhoxSAFA</p> <p>I wonder how many words beginning with c/k you can think of?</p> <p>Can you make your own Silly Soup with objects beginning with the c/k sound? Find the objects or draw pictures of them, put them in a bowl and mix them up, to make a Silly Soup!</p> 	<p>Caterpillar numbers</p> <p>Ask your grownup to write the numbers 1-5.</p> <p>Can you make a caterpillar next to each number, giving him the correct number of blobs for his body? Count them as you go to make sure you've given him the right amount!</p> <p>You could use paint and do fingerprint blobs for his body, or draw them using colouring pencils.</p> <p>Even better, could you do this for the numbers 1-10?</p> 	<p>Favourite mini beast</p> <p>Have a think about your favourite mini beast (bug)?</p> <p>What does it look like? Does it have wings? What colour is it? Does it have legs?</p> <p>Use your words to give your grownup or siblings some clues about your favourite mini beast. Can they can guess which one it is?</p> <p>Then, ask your family to give you some clues about their favourite mini beast. Can you guess what theirs is?</p> 	<p>Nursery Rhymes</p> <p>At Nursery, we sing lots of nursery rhymes together.</p> <p>See if you can remember some of the ones we sing at Nursery. These ones are even about bugs:</p> <p><i>Incy Wincy Spider</i></p> <p><i>There's a Worm at the Bottom of the Garden</i></p> <p>Can you sing some nursery rhymes with your family?</p> <p>See if you can think of some actions to the songs.</p>

Bug hotel

Can you make a bug hotel for the bugs outside your house to enjoy?

It can be as big or small as you like, depending on what you have to use.

A really simple way of making a bug hotel, is to use an empty jar or a toilet roll tube, and collect lots of twigs and leaves to fill it with. Leave it on its side outside, and see which bugs come and have a stay in your bug hotel!



Boing the ball

In the story, Doug the Bug goes 'boing!' bouncing off of different things.

If you have a ball at home, when you are outside play 'boing the ball' with your grown up or sibling.

Pass the ball to each other by bouncing it once on the ground. See if you can catch it when it comes towards you.

You could also try kicking it gently to each other.



Make a bug

Using a toilet roll tube, can you make your favourite bug?

To make one you will need a toilet roll tube, and any resources that you have that could be used to decorate it, like:

Paint

Paper

Colouring pens/pencils

Glue/tape

Pipe cleaners

Bug hunt

Go on a Bug Hunt in your garden, or out on a walk. I wonder how many different bugs you will find!

A good place to look is under plant pots or logs, that's where they like to hide!

It's very important that if you pick up any bugs, you put them back in their homes where you found them.

Choose an insect that you have found. With your grown up, look in an information book or on the internet and see what facts you can learn about your insect.



Mini beast movement

Have a think about how different bugs move around.

There's ants that walk very fast, butterflies who flutter, worms that wriggle, and snails who slide very, very slowly.

When your grownup calls out the name of a mini beast, I wonder if you can move around like you are that mini beast.

Maybe you could then choose a mini beast, and ask your grownup or siblings to guess which mini beast you are.
