English Newspaper Reports	<p>LO: Spot the features of a newspaper report:</p> <p>This week we will be learning all about how to write newspaper reports! Have a go at spotting the different features and underline them with the colour code below:</p> <p>direct speech - red headline - yellow introductory paragraph that contains the 5Ws (lead) -purple fronted adverbials- blue caption- pink third person (he, they, their, she)- orange</p>  <p><u>Why not try?</u></p>  <p>In your Showbie account you will find a short extract from a newspaper report. See if you can answer these questions below:</p> <p>Who is in the story? What happened to the peach? Where did the peach roll? When did it happen?</p>	<p>LO: To write an introductory paragraph using the 5 Ws:</p> <p>Newspaper reports give a summary of the main events in the introductory paragraph by using the 5Ws:</p> <p>Who? What? Where? When? Why?</p> <p>They often call the introductory paragraph the lead.</p> <p>Watch the short video below and see if you can write a 'lead' for this exciting event by using each of the 5Ws in your paragraph!</p> <p>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5JdWkrTnviY</p>  <p>Extra-What heading might you use at the beginning of a newspaper report about this humpback whale? e.g. Wonderful whale in the water!</p> <p><u>Why not try?</u></p> <p>In your Showbie account you will find an activity called 'The 5 Ws'. Remember to start with the ones. If you need to exchange then you would look at the next largest place value column (e.g. if you didn't have enough 10's to complete the subtraction you would exchange one hundred for 10 10's and cross off that exchanged hundred!)

Read the information page which you can find in your Showbie account in your 'topic resources' folder. Have a go at drawing one of the 3 main types of deltas.

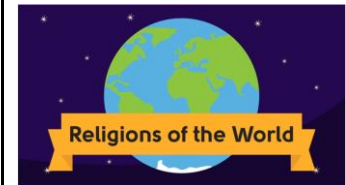
